Yom Kippur

September 18-19, 2018



"Yom Kippur means 'Day of Atonement' and refers to the annual Jewish observance of fasting, prayer and repentance. Part of the High Holidays, which also includes Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur is considered the holiest day on the Jewish calendar. In three separate passages in the Torah, the Jewish people are told, "the tenth day of the seventh month is the Day of Atonement. It shall be a sacred occasion for you: You shall practice selfdenial."(Leviticus 23:27). Fasting is seen as fulfilling this biblical commandment. The Yom Kippur fast also enables us to put aside our physical desires to concentrate on our spiritual needs through prayer repentance and self-improvement.

Yom Kippur is the moment in Jewish time when we dedicate our mind, body, and soul to reconciliation with God, our fellow human beings, and ourselves. We are commanded to turn to those whom we have wronged first, acknowledging our sins and the pain we might have caused. At the same time, we must be willing to forgive and to let go of certain offenses and the feelings of resentment they provoked in us. On this journey we are both seekers and givers of pardon. Only then can we turn to God and ask for forgiveness: 'And for all these, God of forgiveness, forgive us, pardon us, and grant us atonement."

Help us forgive those who hurt us and reconcile with those we have hurt.


Give peace and hope to families who are affected by gun violence.

Jane Addams 1860 - 1935



In 1889, Jane Addams opened the doors of Hull House, the first settlement house for immigrants in the United States, after visiting Toynbee Hall, the world's first settlement house in London. The goal of Hull House was "to provide a center for a higher civic and social life, to institute and maintain educational and philanthropic enterprises, and to investigate and improve the conditions in the industrial districts of Chicago."

The motto of the Settlement House Movement was "Residence, Research, Reform." Jane and others who ran Hull House lived this motto: they actually lived in Hull House and built relationships with the residents. Their work emphasized the practices of social action and reform, with a desire to change the systems of society that oppress immigrants and other disadvantaged people. Hull House and the Settlement House Movement worked to bridge the gap between social classes and restore an emphasis on humanistic principles rather than materialism.

From "The Subtle Problems of Charity," published in the Atlantic in February of 1899, Jane wrote: "We find in ourselves the longing for a wider union than that of family or class, and we say that we have come to include all...in our hopes; but we fail to realize that all...we are hoping, and are part of the same movement of which we are a part. Many of the difficulties in philanthropy come from an unconscious division of the world into the philanthropists and those to be helped. It is all assumption of two classes, and against this class assumption our democratic training revolts as soon as we begin to act upon it."

International Day for the Preservation of the Ozone Layer September 16, 2018

Background

The discovery of the ozone "hole" in the earth's atmosphere came in the 1980s; it has been caused by the use of certain chemicals. The depletion of this layer has caused an increase in skin cancer, a negative impact on the growth of plants and grains, and a contribution to global warming.

Impact on Those in Poverty

Developing countries, which generally pollute much less than developed countries, are more vulnerable to environmental changes due to pollution. They have less health care resources available for environment- related problems. They also face a decrease in agricultural productivity in the tropics and sub-tropics, a decreased water quantity and quality in most arid and semi-arid regions, and an increase in the incidence of malaria and other tropical diseases. Pollution harms ecological systems and their biodiversity, which undermine all efforts for sustainable development.

International Solidarity

The international community worked together, under United Nations guidance, for over a decade to develop the first international ozone protection agreement in 1985 (the Vienna Convention for the Protection of the Ozone Laver). Specific commitments to reduce chlorofluorocarbon (CFC) chemical pollution came in 1987 through the Montreal Protocol on the Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer, signed on September 16. Scientists have called the Montreal Protocol "a life-saving step for the planet," and are seeing the beginnings of what they hope will be an ozone layer recovery, which will take 50-100 years.



Joining Loretto in Solidarity with Suffering People by Regina Drey, SL

On September 15 the sisters and co-members of the Loretto Community honor the Seven Sorrows that Mary, the mother of Jesus, experienced in her life. One of those sorrows Mary experienced was standing at the foot of the cross as Jesus was dying a horrible death by crucifixion. The idea became part of the community's early name — Friends of Mary at the Foot of the Cross.

Since Loretto's founding in 1812, the idea of standing at the foot of the cross has called us to action. Who is struggling? Discarded? Humiliated? Forgotten? Deprived of dignity? Who need us to stand courageously with them?

Today in Loretto, standing in solidarity takes many forms. We stand with Dreamers, asylum seekers, the Earth, children, victims of gun violence, homeless persons, and many other situations needing our compassion.

The call to action happens in Loretto schools as well. We educate students to understand the world close to them and the global society they are also part of. The Loretto School Values of faith, community, justice and respect combined with academic learning helps provide the grounding for standing in solidarity and compassion. For younger students this might mean being kind to a classmate having a hard day or caring for the Earth by cleaning up or recycling. For Middle and High School students, service in the community encourages them to engage with people whose life situations are unlike their own, to see things with new eyes, and help bring about positive change.

Like Mary, we at SMA are called to solidarity and compassion. Guided by the words of Loretto's I Am the Way, "We strive to bring the healing Spirit of God into our world and we commit ourselves to improving the conditions of those who suffer justice, oppression, and deprivation of dignity."

Campus: Did You Know?

The circular stone medallions on either side of the Lower School entrance represent beloved Loretto prayers dating from 1812. "OSJ" stands for O Suffering Jesus, and "OSM" stands for O Sorrowful Mary. They were said at specific times during the day and written as a heading on stationery or school papers as a moment of remembrance.





Hispanic Heritage Month September 15 - October 15, 2018

September 15 was chosen as the beginning of Hispanic Heritage Month because it is the Independence Day anniversary for five Latin American countries — Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua; and on September 16 and September 18, respectively, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days.

PRAYER TO CELEBRATE DIVERSITY



Seven Sorrows Reflection

But how often do we reflect that in her lifetime Mary, as a woman and mother, experienced all the trauma and the suffering peculiar to women of all cultures and all periods of history?"

Paulo Freire A Capacity to Love Through Social Justice 1921-1997

"Paulo Freire was born into a middle-class family in Recife, Brazil, on September 19, 1921. Paulo, along with his siblings, was raised in a Catholic family and brought up to have a concern for others and to recognize the dignity of every person. However, in the early 1930s, the Freire family was caught up in the financial crisis and fell into poverty.

Despite falling behind in his schooling because of his tumultuous childhood, Paulo was drawn to the field of education, especially the education of the poor. He studied law and philosophy at the University of Recife, with a special interest in phenomenology and the psychology of language. Freire spent the beginning of his career teaching language at a secondary school and working with state-run trade unions. In 1944, he married a primary school teacher, Elza Maria Olivera. They had five children and greatly influenced each other's work before Elza's sudden death in 1986.

He became the director of the Brazilian Department of Education and Culture of the Social Service for Industry (SESI). In this role, Freire recognized the role that social and economic environments play in a child's education. It was also during this time that Freire began to embrace liberation theology. In the 1960s, Freire was one of the original supporters of the Popular Culture Movement (PCM). With his appointment to director of the Department of Cultural Extension at the University of Recife in 1961, Freire began coordinating adult literacy trainings in a "cultural circle," where everyday problems were discussed among the poorest in Brazil. This unique approach to literacy was incredibly effective: participants began to read and write after only two or three days.

In 1968, after spending several years in exile in Bolivia and Chile (the Brazilian military leaders viewed him as a "revolutionary and an ignorant"), Paulo Freire wrote his most famous book, The Pedagogy of the Oppressed. The premises of Freire's proposed pedagogy are that the student is a cocreator of knowledge and that an equal relationship exists between the teacher, the student, and society. His "educational thrust centers on the human potential for creativity and freedom in the midst of politico-economic and culturally oppressive structures" (Gerhardt, 11). The Pedagogy of the Oppressed is considered a foundational document in education pedagogy and is used by educators and scholars around the world to this day."

"Marie Dennis has been co-president of Pax Christi International since 2007, a position she shares with Bishop Kevin Dowling from South Africa. From 1989-2012, 15 years as director, Marie worked with the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns, charged with bringing the global experience of Maryknoll missioners into the process of shaping public opinion in the United States and policies of the U.S. and other governments, the United Nations and international financial institutions. Marie is a laywoman and a mother of six. She holds a masters degree in moral theology from Washington Theological Union and honorary doctorates from Trinity Washington University and Alvernia University.

Author or co-author of seven books, Marie serves on the steering committee of the Catholic Peacebuilding Network and as a contributing editor to Sojourners magazine, and recently ended her service on the national board of JustFaith Ministries. She has previously served on the White House Task Force on Global Poverty and Development; the advisory committee of Orbis Books; and the boards of the Washington Office on Latin America, the Latin America Working Group, the International Resource Center, the Washington Office on Africa and the Jubilee USA Network. A Pax Christi USA Ambassador of Peace, Marie has served on the board of Pax Christi International since 1999."
